Ms Ulrich read the proclamation into the record.

7. Citizens Address

Michelle Lewis - She spoke about her opinion that Colerain Township is in a crisis. She mentioned mutual aid agreements and asked if they were still in effect. She said crime has overridden our community. She spoke in favor of flock cameras. She said her elderly neighbors are afraid to answer their door.

Rose Inderhees - She spoke in favor of flock cameras. She said we are in dire need of them. She said that other municipalities are using flock cameras successfully. She said we should trust Chief Cordie's opinion that we need the cameras.

Stephanie Wright - She spoke about public records requests. She mentioned the CSR system. She spoke about the boards in Colerain and said there's no consistency with the boards. She wanted to know who would pay for the flock cameras.

Jenny Braun - She spoke in favor of flock cameras. She said she was shocked that only one trustee was at the community meeting on safety. She urges the board to look into flock cameras.

Clifford Bernhardt - He spoke about his concern of businesses buying our properties.

Chad Ballard - He spoke in favor of flock cameras. He said ODOT has cameras in Colerain. He spoke about the surrounding communities that are using flock cameras. He asked that the board give flock cameras a try. He said the cameras have solved crimes. He said not one of the communities that use flock cameras don't have anything bad to say about them.

Lori McMullin - She said Yay for Marino streetlights. She thanked the neighbors there who helped make that happen. She spoke about the trust the residents have in the board to keep them safe. She said there are rules in place for flock cameras. She spoke about success stories from other communities.

Carrie Davis - She asked to have the flock discussion moved up on the agenda. She spoke about the neighborhood meeting on safety. She said the township should have had a meeting when it (shooting) happened. She mentioned Ms Ulrich was the only trustee who came to the meeting. She spoke about the poll they took at the meeting. She said the

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community wants flock cameras.

8. **Administrative Reports**

Fire Chief Walls - For the month of December we had 833 EMS incidents, 183 fire incidents, 40 calls into the Pleasant Run EMS contract area, 2 significant fires. Property value lost for the month \$160,800 with property saved at \$321,193 with a YTD saved value of \$16.7 million . Average response time was 4:45.

Police Chief Cordie - For the year we responded to 45213 calls for service, an average of 124 per day. We conducted 3841 traffic stops, handled 1587 crash reports, made 1171 arrests, 111 OVI arrests. We 3574 citations and 16 vehicle pursuits.

Mr Wahlert motioned to move the flock discussion, Seconded Mr Unger

Ms Molter - Park visitors for December was 2896, Heritage Park had 2235 and Colerain had 2543. We collected 216 bags of trash. She also spoke about snow plow operations.

Total 2024 incident responses = 10.

\$350.00 per response = \$3,500.00 cost recovery.

Average incident response = 00:14:24. Total working time for 10 responses = 03:33:22.

Cost recovery/total working time = \$984.22 per hour.

- i. Motion to Authorize the Township Administrator to Execute a Purchase Agreement with LexisNexis Risk Solutions

Chief Cordie recommended ADOPTION of the Motion.

Rationale: The agreement with LexisNexis Risk Solutions will provide the Police Department with an additional search engine for investigative purposes as well as a module to provide crime mapping to the community. The agreement terms are for two years with the first year (1/1/25 through 12/31/25) costing \$5,000 and the second year (1/1/26 through 12/31/26) costing \$6,000. The agreement states that it will continue to automatically renew each year after. The Police Department will annually review this contract to determine the usage, and necessity for renewal.

- Motion Authorizing Township Administrator to Execute an Agreement with
- a. Choice One for Right of Way Plans for Springdale Road Sidewalks at a cost of \$88,000

Ms Molter recommended ADOPTION of the Motion.

Rationale: Choice One is the current engineering firm that is designing the sidewalks that will be constructed from the Township Administration building to Poole Road on Springdale Road. The original agreement did not include Right-Of-Way design and this change order would adjust the contract to ensure that those plans are properly developed. This change order is for \$88,000 as there is significant right-of-way design associated with this project due to the high number of properties included in the project boundaries. This change order brings the total contract for design and engineering for this project to \$212,576. The Township has received a grant from OKI for half of the construction costs and will seek additional grants for the remaining costs.

- b. Motion Authorizing Township Administrator to Execute an Agreement for Joseph Road Sidewalk Contracts

Ms Molter recommended ADOPTION of the Motion.

Rationale: The Township received 11 responses to the public bid for the construction of new sidewalks along Joseph Road. The bid table for the project is attached. At the posting of this agenda, staff was still analyzing the final bids and will have a recommendation prepared for Tuesday night.

Mr Weckbach - We have received grant funding for this. Construction will be fully funded by outside entities.

Mr Unger - This has been a township/school district issue since 2008, probably.

Mr Wahlert - A lot of students park in Home Depot so this is a safety concern.

Mr Weckbach - There will be a dedicated crosswalk for this sidewalk.

- c. Motion Authorizing Change Order for Joseph Road Sidewalk Design with Brandstetter Carroll in the amount of \$12,432.50

Ms Molter recommended ADOPTION of the Motion.

Rationale: Throughout the design of the Joseph Road sidewalk project, there were two change orders in the design: 1. Additional Stormwater calculations, as required by the

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Hamilton County Engineer 2. Redesign of the retaining wall to find a solution that would meet ADA requirements The total for this change order is \$12,432.50. As a reminder, the original contract in 2023 was for \$19,500.

Rationale: The signed mileage certification form is submitted to ODOT per Ohio Revised Code, Section 4501.04. The form is prepared by the County Engineer and reflects all changes to the total mileage for Colerain Township. At the end of 2024 the total miles certified for the Township is 116.033 miles.

e. Motion to Authorize the Township Administrator to Execute an Agreement with Adleta Construction for the 2025 Road Program for \$1,904,130.54

Ms Molter recommended ADOPTION of the Motion.
Rationale: The Township received six responses to the Request for Bids for the 2025 Road Program. Of these, Adleta Construction was the low bidder at \$1,904,130.54. This cost is \$4,130.54 over budget. Staff will make cuts in other areas to balance the need for the full contract. For the 2025 program the following streets will receive a 2 inch mill and fill:

- Hollyridge
- Chippenham
- Glenknoll
- Hawkhurst
- Hollybrook
- Planet
- Commodore
- Haverknoll
- Cheltenham

A bid alternate was requested for Spiritridge. Due to the high costs, that street is not recommended for the 2025 program.

f. Resolution to Accept Capital Grant Funding in the Amount of \$75,000 and to

Rationale: The state of Ohio recently signed the Capital Budget Bill, which included \$75,000 to fund a climbing boulder at Heritage Park. Approval of this Resolution will allow the Township Administrator to execute all related agreements with the State of Ohio to ensure funding is able to be received by the Township for this project. Attached is the local agreement template, which will be filled out by ODNR in the coming weeks. There is no match requirement associated with this grant. These dollars were also anticipated and included in the 2025 Budget.

- c. Hamilton County for Community Development Block Grant Funding in the amount of \$290,000

Mr Weckbach recommended ADOPTION of the Motion.

Rationale: Every three years, Hamilton County will evaluate requests for projects to be funded through Community Development Block Grant dollars. In this most recent cycle, the County has awarded funding for four projects:

- \$40,000: Geraldine Sidewalk Improvements and Reconstruction
- \$100,000: Springdale Sidewalk and Pedestrian Improvements
- \$50,000: Groesbeck Park Improvements
- \$100,000: Residential Rehabilitation

Each project will go through a separate procurement process prior to execution.

Discussion:

Mr Wahlert - Wasn't the sidewalk rated good by SORTA recently

Mr Weckbach - That is correct.

Mr Wahlert - But there's no sidewalk there.

- d. Motion Authorizing the Administrator to Enter into a License Agreement with Malwarebytes

Mr Weckbach recommended ADOPTION of the Motion.

Rationale: This quote for a Continuing License Agreement would allow the Township to continue to subscribe to Malwarebytes Threatdown Advanced and Threatdown Advanced Server malware protection services. These services provide PC endpoint protection against viruses and malware and are critical for the Township's cybersecurity. The license agreement has a three-year term and a total cost of \$15,859.20.

- e. Motion to Appoint a Trustee to the board of the Colerain Township - City of Cheviot Joint Economic Development District (Liberty Nursing)

Rationale: Trustee Wahlert has served as the Township Member of the Liberty Nursing JEDD board since January 2, 2020, when he was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Trustee Insco. He was reappointed to a four-year term on January 4, 2022 and his

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term expired at the end of 2024.

- f. Motion Authorizing the Administrator to Enter into an Agreement with Tri-State Visual Products, Inc.

Mr Weckbach recommended ADOPTION of the Motion.

Rationale: The existing audio-visual system in the Trustee Chambers is ten-years old, has limited functionality, and is nearing obsolescence. Tri-State Visual Products, Inc. has quoted an update that would include a new switch, processor, transmitters, receivers, and a speaker timer system. These upgradewould improve the operation of the projector as well. The total cost to complete the improvements is \$20,555.

- g. Motion Authorizing the Administrator to Enter into an Agreement with Prosource

Mr McElravy recommended ADOPTION of the Motion.

Rationale: The Township's copiers are beyond their service life and some are starting to fail. In addition, service costs have increased due to the age of the equipment and the frequency of service calls. This agreement will allow the Township to replace five copiers at the fire stations, two in the Police Department, one that is shared by Public Services and Fire and EMS, and one that is used in Administration. This upgrade will allow the Township to save \$374/month on maintenance fees. The total cost of the replacement is \$49,000.

- h. Resolution Adopting Safe Routes to Schools Travel Plan

Mr Weckbach recommended ADOPTION of Resolution #16-25.

Rationale: Safe Routes to School (SRTS) is an international movement that uses policies, programs, and infrastructure to encourage youth K-12 to walk and bike to school. SRTS seeks to improve safety conditions near schools and encourage more walking and bicycling when safe to do so. Entities with an approved SRTS plan can apply for up to 100% funding on critical sidewalk projects from the state of Ohio.

Trustee Ulrich has requested a conversation on the potential purchase of FLOCK cameras for the Police Department.

Discussion:

Mr Wahlert - One resident said no one else can log in?

Chief Cordie - Only the owner of the cameras can log in.

Mr Wahlert - There's no law that requires that data is deleted in 30 days?

Chief Cordie - Not that I'm aware of.

Mr Wahlert - I'm concerned about the 30 day window. Our data is our data for 30 days.

But if flock re-packages it, there is no obligation.

Chief Cordie - I'm not the expert, but I can bring in an expert. We can share the data with other communities.

Brodi Conover - We have negotiated with Flock in other communities. Data is in the cloud for 30 days. My understanding is that private users have increased requirements then law enforcement.

Mr Unger - He spoke about potential for this data to get all over the place. My concern is with the privacy of this.

Motion to allocate \$50,000 from discretionary funds from Ms Ulrich and \$20,000 from Mr Wahlert for license plate reading camera technology Mr Wahlert, Seconded Ms Ulrich.

Re: STATEMENT OF MICHELLE LEWIS, RESIDENT OF COLERAIN TOWNSHIP.

Good evening, my name is Michelle Lewis, and I am a resident here in Colerain Twp.

I came this evening out of concern about the two recent violent events over the last approximate nine months – first with the Kroger incident on Springdale Road and more recently with the events that occurred at the Popeyes, Shell gas station and Walgreens at the intersection of Colerain Avenue and Springdale Roads. Many community members and officials may have their own beliefs as to why we in Colerain are seeing an uptick crime I just spoke about. I have my own ideas on the subject too. However, I am here today to focus on providing ideas toward strengthening our community, especially as it relates to the safety and well-being of our community members and those people who come to Colerain to visit and do business.

My ideas are based on my personal and professional experiences while living in other parts of the country – which range from small town to big city USA. Some of what I will share this evening may produce a knee jerk reaction – my intention is not to “blame” but more to “how” we can fix things. For me, this subject matter comes down to accountability and recognition from the community and local officials that we must change the lens in which we look at the escalation of crime and violence in Colerain. Change can be accomplished by all of us – the community, the police department, and officials in leadership positions.

First, there must be recognition by the community that crime is here in Colerain, and it's been here. The two egregious acts of gun violence are the only things that have brought this subject to the forefront for many. It's time for us to stop keeping our head in the sand or hold the belief that me and my family have nothing to worry about. We all should be worried, and we need the community to step up and get involved. The Colerain Police Department's website outlines several ways to get involved. We must get out of our comfort zones and make the time to partner with our officials and each other if we want our community to be like those of Mason, Anderson, West Chester, Fairfield, or Liberty Township.

Secondly, our police department (in my opinion) must engage in aggressive policing. Period. Constant and consistent traffic and pedestrian stops, checking people for warrants, guns, or drugs, and making arrests. I am not implying that there is no room for “community policing” which focuses on developing community partnerships, engaging in problem solving, and implementing or sustaining community policing organizations like neighborhood watches. But for the most part, I believe that approach has sailed, and we must look at approaches to combat the problems that continue to plague us here in Colerain Township.

Lastly, to my neighbors who have taken in their family whether it be sons, daughters, nieces, nephews, or grandchildren who are “troubled,” I applaud you and can appreciate your efforts. But, if your family members are committing crimes and they are apprehended in Colerain, please hold them accountable even if that means they need to go to jail and face the consequences of their actions. This mindset cannot solely fall on our police department – “family” has a responsibility and can no longer make excuses for why their loved one is in trouble. Help your loved one through tough love – partner with schools, churches, mental health organizations and through other resources in the greater Cincinnati area.

Where do we go from here? Well, let’s not reinvent the wheel. When it comes to gun violence, I’d like to share the following resources for consideration which may provide Colerain Township Officials opportunities to be part of the solution now and into the future.

- Just today our local Fox News station highlighted Ms. Shannon Hughes with the organization Ignite Peace and one of her advocacy goals is to provide anti-violence education. Can our public officials reach out to Ms. Hughes and invite collaborative efforts between our township and the organization, Ignite Peace?

- Also, can Colerain officials partner with the Firearm-Related Injury Task Force at Cincinnati's Children's Hospital, whose goal is to reduce firearm related injuries through collaborative efforts in safety, gun violence prevention, and advocacy efforts? The team is collaborating with the City of Cincinnati to help devise a city-wide strategy for gun violence reduction, which includes action groups. The group is looking into the future as they obtained a \$600,000 dollar grant to build the first joint pediatric and adult hospital-based violence intervention program together with UC Health.

At a minimum Colerain Township has an opportunity to review the plan and possibly obtain some best practices.

Good evening, trustees,

The title "Trustee" means many things to the residents of Colerain, but the one I want to talk about is our trust in you to make the right decisions to keep us safe. Being safe is a very broad ideal, but tonight I mean our physical safety due to criminal acts, as well as our digital data privacy safety.

In my day-to-day job, I'm paid to keep our computer systems aligned with best practices and in compliance with global regulations used by the FDA and other regulatory agencies such as being compliant with FDA 21 CFR Part 11, ICH, GxP, GDPR, Annex 11 in Europe and so many more acronyms. Data privacy is not a new topic to me.

Citizens expect companies to follow applicable regulations and have policies and safeguards in place to reduce the risk of data breaches. We also expect a certain amount of control with how our data is used and stored, encrypted, and destroyed.

In the case of Flock and other license plate readers, there are regulations, rules, and laws in place to help reduce the inherent risks of a data exposure, however, there is not a computer system on the planet that is 100% safe from being hacked. Hackers and AI are actively trying to get into your servers right now, and that's an absolute fact. It's how these data breaches are lessened that matters.

For residents, we recognize that there is a certain amount of risk associated with license plate readers. For example, if there had been a Flock camera at Colerain Avenue and Springdale Road tonight, it would have documented a blue Chevrolet Equinox, license plate number FOP 9641 with a white shark sticker on the back window driving through around 6:45 this evening. Or if there was a camera installed on Blue Rock Road, it would have documented a brown Chevrolet Venture minivan driving through, too. If the data for those two vehicles were stored on Flock's servers that got hacked within the 30-day storage window, the descriptions I read about each car is all the information the hacker would obtain.

License plate readers are not collecting the driver's name, address, phone number, picture or appearance, race, gender, or who the vehicle is even registered to, etc. If they wanted personal information about you, they would then need to breach the Ohio BMV website. For me, this is a risk I am comfortable accepting for the safety of me, my family, my friends, my neighbors, and my community.

I keep mentioning Flock, but I do want to state that I recognize there are other options available, some where the vendor assumes all the risks and responsibilities with hosting our data while we still own it or others like Verkada where Colerain Township would host and own the data. Either way, residents are being asked to put more trust in someone else to keep their information safe. In today's world, it's a nearly impossible task but being in the working world in which I clock into every day, but my vote is with the experts in the industry and not the township.

The agencies immediately around us have also made similar investments in community safety and have chosen Flock. If we had it too, then the recent triple shooting could have possibly had an additional lead for the investigators to follow within minutes after the shooting. They could have tracked the shooter's vehicle while driving away within Colerain and into another surrounding jurisdiction who is also using Flock, making the tracking of the vehicle seamless.

If your future decision is to not implement Flock, then we lose the benefit of aligning the same tool with our fellow departments, meaning the shooter's car enters Mt. Healthy, Fairfield, Green Township, or others, we are back at square one because the trust we put in our trustees to make the right choice didn't happen as residents have asked. In the research I have done, Flock and Verkada and others do not work with one another. I'm sure you realize Flock is the leader in the industry and gives us the advantage of also using the NCIC (FBI data base), which Verkada and others do not. This gives our PD the ability to cross reference the vehicles with warrants, serious felonies, stolen vehicles, and missing person reports, as soon as the vehicle enters Colerain. There are not many opportunities given to law enforcement in which they could be proactive, but Flock could give them that.

I could go on and on, but I'll leave you with this. I appreciate Mrs. Ulrich's past votes to support Flock. I even place value in Mr. Unger's and Mr. Wahlert's votes to attempt to keep our data private, but in our current world, if you have a computer or smart phone or even just leave your house, your data is already being captured in a million different ways. What is not safe, still, is us.

Loveland Flock success stories

Recent Success Story

January 2024 Officers stopped and arrested two subjects for stealing mail from a Loveland residents' mailbox. Detectives searched the FLOCK database, and it provided information on the subject's movements through multiple states. The suspects were ultimately charged with multiple counts of felony theft for crimes in Loveland and will likely face additional federal criminal charges from the US Postal Inspection Service for crimes in several states.

February 2024 Officers received an alert on a stolen vehicle entering Loveland. The FLOCK photo showed the vehicle on the back of a car hauler and officers located it in a local business lot. Through investigation, it was determined to have been bought at an auto auction in Minnesota by a third party and was in the process of being transported to South Carolina to the internet purchaser. The recovered stolen vehicle was originally taken in North Dakota and information was passed on to the entering agency who will continue the investigation.

Recent Success Story

On December 1, 2024, LPD received a report of a Breaking and Entering offense at a downtown business. The only lead was a general time frame and a video image of a hooded suspect inside the establishment. Utilizing the FLOCK database, officers worked to establish a list of vehicles in the area around the time of the offense. Their efforts produced a list of approximately 32 vehicles including one related to a previous employee. When interviewed the suspect admitted to multiple offenses. The FLOCK information saved numerous investigative hours and enhanced the officer's ability to advance the investigation much faster than if forced to review hours of surveillance footage.
